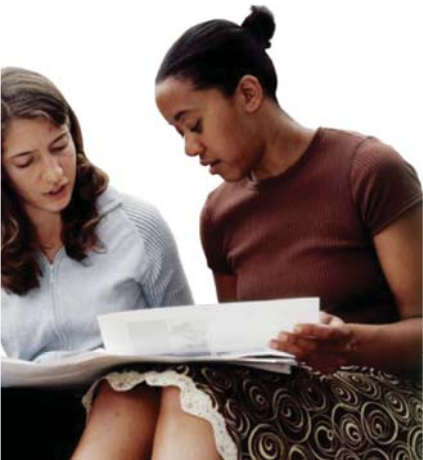

Low literacy skills are directly linked to poverty, poor health and high unemployment. Nearly one in six adult Canadians has trouble with everyday tasks that involve reading. That's millions of Canadians who are not reaching their potential!

Literacy is more than just the ability to read and write. It's the ability to understand the printed word and to put it to use and to engage fully in activities and opportunities at home, at work and in the community. It's about succeeding in today's world.

## FRONTIER COLLEGE

Founded in 1899 by a small group of university students, Frontier College began by sending student volunteers to the frontiers of Canada: logging camps, mining towns and rail gangs. They worked alongside workers during the day and taught in the evenings and on weekends.

Today, we work with Canadians who have little or no access to other educational opportunities or who need extra support – wherever they are.

With almost one in six adult Canadians experiencing reading difficulties, Frontier College is needed now more than ever. We are continuing our role as a **LEADER IN THE LITERACY MOVEMENT** by doing what we have always done – reaching out to people and responding to their learning needs.

...We work in communities across Canada by training volunteers to help children, youth and adults with low literacy improve their skills. 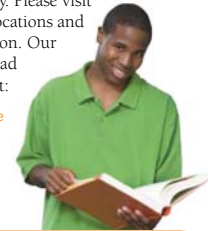
## WHAT WE DO
